# **INTRODUCTION**

Reentry is a particularly challenging and vulnerable time for people who are released from prison, and support can be vital to maintaining stability and avoiding recidivism. This guide was designed to help with the most pressing issues you will face as you plan for reentry, and are eventually released.

Los Angeles is the largest reentry point for people leaving California prisons. There are many reentry service providers in the L.A. area that are willing and able to assist you. This guide lists many of them, but it is not comprehensive. This guide also does not provide legal advice.

You should use this guide as a self-help resource; we hope that as you plan for reentry, you will find the best services and organizations to address your needs.

We wish you all the best on your journey to reentry in Los Angeles.

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# **PAROLE OVERVIEW**

When you are released, it is important to always meet your parole commitments and conditions. Stay in close communication with your parole agent to ensure all requirements are being met.

# FIRST STEPS

- CDCR requires you to report to and/or contact your assigned parole office on the first business day following your release, unless you are instructed otherwise
- If you are released over the weekend, report to and/or contact the office on Monday morning

# GENERAL CONDITIONS OF PAROLE

Speak with your parole agent if you are not aware of, or do not understand your parole conditions. In addition to the specific conditions assigned to you, you must follow the general conditions of parole. All conditions will be provided to you in writing, but some helpful conditions to remember are:


# **Key Conditions and Requirements:**

- All laws must be obeyed
- You cannot own, use, nor have access to any weapon prohibited by the California Penal Code
- Your parole agent must always be aware of your housing and work locations
  - New home addresses should be given to your parole agent before you move
  - New job positions or address changes should be given to your parole agent within three days
- Prior to traveling more than 50 miles from your home, you must have approval from your parole agent. In order to leave the state you must also obtain a travel pass

# **Law Enforcement:**

- If you interact with law enforcement for any reason, inform them that you are on parole
- If you get arrested, inform your parole agent as soon as possible
- If someone commits a crime against you, call the police and inform your parole agent as soon as possible

# **IDENTIFICATION**

# SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER AND CARD

Your Social Security Number (and possibly Social Security Card) may be requested when you obtain a job, get paid wages, and use certain government services. Typically, knowing your Social Security number is enough, but if you need a new card, you may apply for one.

# TO APPLY FOR A SOCIAL SECURITY CARD:

- Call the Social Security Administration to ask about additional identification requirements for parolees
- Cards are typically ordered online, but can also be ordered in person in limited circumstances

# When you apply, the following documentation will be required:

- Citizenship:
  - o U.S. Citizens must show a U.S. birth certificate or U.S. passport
  - o Non-U.S. Citizens must show your current U.S. immigration document, such as:
    - Form I-551 (Lawful Permanent Resident Card, Machine Readable Immigrant Visa) with your unexpired foreign passport;
    - I-766 (Employment Authorization Document, EAD, work permit); or
    - I-94 (Arrival/Departure Record) or admission stamp in the unexpired foreign passport
- **Age**: Birth certificate (if a birth certificate does not exist SSA *may* accept a religious record made before the age of five showing your date of birth, a US hospital record of your birth, or a US passport)
- **Identity**: Acceptable documentation must not be expired, show your name, date of birth or age, and preferably a recent photograph
  - Examples of acceptable identification include a U.S. driver's license, State-issued non-driver identification card, or a U.S. Passport
  - If those documents are not available, SSA will ask to see other documents that are not expired, show your name, show your age or date of birth, and preferably have a recent photograph

#### CALIFORNIA STATE ID CARD OR DRIVER'S LICENSE

The California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) may issue an identification card to persons of any age. To apply for an ID card, follow the instructions on the California DMV website: <a href="https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/driver-licenses-identification-cards/identification-id-cards/">https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/driver-licenses-identification-id-cards/</a>

#### TO APPLY FOR AN ID CARD:

- Complete a Driver's License (DL) or ID Card Application.
- Visit a <u>DMV office</u>, where you will:
  - o Provide your social security number (SSN).
  - Verify your identity with an <u>acceptable identity document</u>. Your current name needs to match the name on the identity document. Examples include- Certified copy of birth certificate, valid/unexpired U.S.
     Passport, U.S. Certificate of Naturalization, valid/unexpired Permanent Resident Card/Resident Alien Card, and more.
  - Present <u>acceptable residency documents</u> (if you have never had a California DL/ID card).
  - o Pay the nonrefundable application fee (see below for information about reduced- and no-fee ID cards).
  - Have your thumbprint scanned.
  - o Have your photo taken.

If you want to apply for a <u>REAL ID</u>, you must also provide proof of your identity, SSN, and two proofs of residency from the list of acceptable REAL ID documents.

As of the May 3, 2023 deadline, you must present a federal compliant ID (such as a passport, military ID, or a REAL ID) to board a domestic flight or enter certain secure federal facilities like military bases, federal courthouses, or other federal buildings.

You will receive your new ID card via mail within 3-4 weeks. If you have not received your new ID card after 60 days, call us at 1-800-777-0133 to check the status.

#### **REDUCED FEE ID CARDS**

Generally, there is a nonrefundable fee to apply for a new ID card, to renew an ID card, or to change your name on your ID card. In certain circumstances, the fee may be waived or reduced:

- Reduced fee ID card: You may be eligible to pay a reduced application fee for an original or renewal ID card if
  you meet income requirements for selected governmental or non-profit assistance programs. If you are eligible,
  the program will give you a completed Verification for Reduced Fee Identification Card (DL 937) form to take to
  DMV office. See your local public assistance program agency for information about eligibility requirements and
  obtaining a DL 937.
- No-fee ID card: You may be eligible for a no-fee ID card if you are a "homeless person" as defined by the McKinney-Vento Act. This includes (but isn't limited to) a homeless child or youth, a homeless person, or an individual or family fleeing domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or another dangerous, lifethreatening condition.
- Senior ID card: To qualify for a no-fee senior citizen ID card, you must be at least 62 years old.

#### **BIRTH CERTIFICATE**

Birth certificates are a record of your birth, and are often required in order to obtain other forms of identification, like driver's licenses and social security cards. When you request a birth certificate, be sure to request a certified copy. A certified copy is an official version of the birth certificate that can only be requested by yourself, an immediate family member, or others with a "direct and tangible interest" to request the record.

#### PERSONS BORN OUTSIDE OF CALIFORNIA:

The state you were born in has control over your birth records, and every state has a different process for obtaining a copy of your birth certificate. Contact your local government office or check your state website to determine how to obtain a copy of your record. The cost to obtain a birth certificate ranges from approximately \$10.00 to \$35.00.

# Online:

CDPH does not accept online orders. However, there are third party companies that you can order a birth certificate from. Using a third party means paying more for your birth certificate. #### By Mail:

# **Certified Copies and Sworn Statements**

A certified copy can be used to establish the identity of the person named on the certificate. If you are requesting a certified copy, you MUST provide a notarized sworn statement (see page 5 of application) declaring under penalty of perjury that you are authorized by law to receive the certified copy (see application for list of authorized individuals). If you are requesting a certified copy and a notarized sworn statement is not included, CDPH-VR will not accept your request for processing.

# What to Submit for a Certified Copy of a Birth Certificate

- Completed "Application for Certified Copy of Birth Record" (VS 111)
- Notarized sworn statement (if applicable)
- \$25 fee per copy requested (check or money order in US dollars, made payable to CDPH-Vital Records) NO CASH

#### **Applicant Notification**

If your request is accepted, CDPH-VR will process the application and mail out a copy of the certificate(s) you requested.

# TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

Securing housing may be the most important, and most difficult aspect of your release plan. You should seek the type of housing that will be most beneficial for your reintegration, and choose housing that satisfies your conditions of parole.

### **KEY CONSIDERATIONS**

Short-term/transitional housing may be the first place you arrive when you are released. You can look at transitional housing as a bridge between incarceration and long-term housing that provides an environment for successful reentry.

Many transitional housing programs offer additional services including relapse prevention, financial assistance, referrals to legal services, transportation, and more. The parole board will expect your housing and programming to address the causative factors of your crime. When you search for transitional housing, ask about what programs and services are available.

Some questions you should consider when choosing transitional housing include:

- Are you eligible based upon your parole conditions/classifications (i.e. sex offender status)?
- Are you entering a structured program with in-house or community-based support services?
- Does the program address the *causative factors* of your crime?
- What kind of *environment* do you want to live in?
  - o Consider size, location, level of assistance, length of stay, cost, age/social styles of the other residents, etc.
- How rigorous do you want your program to be?
  - o Consider courses, schedules, work requirements, discharge requirements etc.
- What additional services will you want/need assistance with?
  - o Consider transportation, medical care, sober living, employment assistance, family reunification, etc.
- How close do you want to be to family, friends, and support networks?

# **APPLYING**

Some transitional housing providers will allow you to apply while still incarcerated, and others will not. When you reach out to providers, ask them about their application and waitlist policies to help make your decision.

Once accepted you will need to obtain a letter of support from the transitional housing program for your parole hearing. Be sure to inform the program of your reentry and rehabilitative needs so that they may be addressed in their letter of support.

#### **IDENTIFICATION**

Obtaining long-term housing often requires identification and proof of income. You can begin the process of obtaining identification while you are still incarcerated, however many transitional housing programs assist residents with this task. The most important forms of identification include your: Birth Certificate, Social Security Card, State Issued Identification (Including a Driver's License), and Naturalization Certificate (For Non-U.S. Citizens)

#### TRANSITIONING TO LONG TERM HOUSING

**Discharge Requirements**: Most programs have requirements that must be completed before you leave. Ask about what requirements you must complete to help decide what program is best for you.

**Long-Term Housing**: In addition to identification, to secure long-term housing you may be required to show work history, proof of income, and credit history. Credit history is something that you should consider building (or improving) while you are in transitional housing.




211 LA maintains a database of over 50,000 health and human services in Los Angeles County. You can utilize their search engine to find transitional/short-term and emergency housing.

# **LEGAL SERVICES**

Sometimes people face legal issues once they are released, which may create a barrier to successful reentry. Legal issues may include child support related matters, outstanding fines and fees, difficulties obtaining licenses or access to federal aid due to criminal convictions, and more.

There are many pro-bono and low-cost legal service providers in Los Angeles. When you contact potential attorneys, be sure to thoroughly explain the legal matter you need addressed. Do not rule them out if they are not pro bono attorneys as they may be able to offer their services on a sliding scale.

# PAROLE CONDITIONS & BACKGROUND CHECKS

**Parole Conditions:** Parole conditions are imposed by the Board of Parole Hearings (BPH), or the Department of Adult Parole Operations (DAPO). In the event that you believe a parole condition is unlawful, you may challenge it. To do so, BPH and DAPO have processes in place.

**Background Checks**: When you apply for housing, employment, or other services, they may run a background check. Background checks use internet results, public records, and other sources to find information about your past activities, which may include work history, criminal history, debts, work experience, motor vehicle and license records, and more. However, there are laws in California that prohibit certain information from being reported.
